

## Updated 07.11.20: Information for parents and guardians about the Covid-19 situation and coming measures:

We are still at code YELLOW in Oslo.

As The City Government of Oslo informed at a press conference on the 6th of November, the spread of Covid-19 in Oslo is serious. New measures will be put in place from midnight Monday 9th of November in order to limit social contact between the inhabitants. This social closure of the society and Oslo is done to maintain open schools for our pupils. In this situation, it is important to maintain the everyday life as normal as possible for children and youth. Primary and lower secondary schools are still at code yellow, but at Majorstuen school we will nevertheless impose some new measures in order to prevent possible spread of Covid-19. It is important to be aware that even if we were to enter code red, all pupils are expected to attend school. We have been notified from The City Government that we should prepare the lower secondary school for code red, if the situation remains the same as today. The measures imposed, will be in place for three weeks, unless we are instructed otherwise from the government.

### **Lower secondary school, levels 8-10:**

- Foreign language at levels 8-10 will be conducted digitally in the classrooms of each class.
- Elective subjects for levels 8-10 will be taught via Teams. The teachers will provide information in the different subjects as to where the classes are being held (at home or on Teams), and).
- Music and Arts & Craft will be taught as normally, until further notice.
- Food & Health will be taught as normally.
- Domus Atletica, where some of the classes have had Physical Education, will close on Tuesday 10th of November. The classes affected by the closure will until further notice have schemes they must do from home, and will be individually followed up by their teacher.
- Only one class from 9th grade will be allowed in the school canteen per day during mid day break. The school will provide a schedule for the days each class have access to the canteen during the week.
- The School Food Project for the 8th grade will be starting on November 13th. From this date on, the pupils in 8th grade will receive a ready made lunch pack, as an alternative to the communal lunch break in the canteen.

- There will be increased focus on hygiene measures in the class rooms, and we will remind everyone to keep social distance, wash their hands, and to stay at home if you are ill or not feeling well.
- Meetings in the Pupil Council, SMU (School Environment Committee), Parents Working Committee and the School Board will be held digitally until further notice.

### **Primary school levels 1-7 and Aktivitetsskolen (The After School Programme) at Majorstuen skole**

For pupils in primary school, the tuition will continue exactly as today, as long as we stay on code yellow. We have been notified that the swimming courses on level 3 and 4 will continue as they do today. The same goes for all other activities at primary school level.
